ADAAWE has grown from an idea to a community of more than 200 Indigenous entrepreneurs.

Karen Smith, Founder of <u>Aunties Catering Services</u>, and a participant in the ADAAWE Incubator Program stated, "After seeing ADAAWE on social media, I decided to sign up for a photography workshop. Little did I know that I had stumbled upon an incredible community of passionate entrepreneurs who were as creative and driven as myself. I've hardly left the Hub ever since! ADAAWE is more than a resource centre because this hub breeds opportunities naturally. Since becoming a member, the Hub has provided me with retail space, networking events, workshop development, a physical workspace with technology, and photography space and camera access. Many proud accomplishments have been achieved in the first year, all of which support and nurture a pathway to strengthen Indigenous Prosperity and the Indigenous economy in Canada. Some highlights include:

Membership Growth - ADAAWE proudly welcomes over 200 members into its thriving community. These members are the heart and soul of our hub, representing a diverse and dynamic group of Indigenous entrepreneurs.

Community Engagement - Four major community events have been organized and hosted, creating a sense of unity and collaboration not only among our members but also within the broader Ottawa community.

Knowledge and Skill Building - Over 100 workshops and training sessions have been conducted, equipping Indigenous entrepreneurs with the tools and knowledge necessary to thrive in today's business landscape.

Mentorship Support - ADAAWE has provided more than 250 mentor office hours, offering invaluable guidance and wisdom to aspiring Indigenous entrepreneurs.

Cutting-Edge Facilities - A state-of-the-art production studio has been launched, enhancing our members' ability to create and innovate.

Incubator Program - ADAAWE initiated a major incubator program pilot, supporting Indigenous entrepreneurs in their journey to build their businesses full-time for three months.

Strategic Partnerships - Meaningful partnerships with key organizations such as <u>BDC</u>, <u>Invest Ottawa</u>, Gowlings, and <u>TikTok</u> have been established, strengthening our support network, and expanding opportunities for our members.

Member-Led Initiatives - ADAAWE has supported over 25 member-led programs, contributing over \$50,000 in procurements into the ADAAWE Member community through services and products offered in our Pop-Up shop and in operating day-to-day programs and activities.
